BUNMARRA CORROBOREE EXCURSION



Bunmarra Corroboree 2022 Student Reflection



On Tuesday 23rd August, we went to Punchbowl Public School for the very first Bunmarra Corroboreea day for all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to meet each other and create connections
across the Chullora school network. Our Banksia Road students, Callum of the Biripi tribe and Connor
and Xavier of the Wonnarua tribe, attended along with 41 other students from schools including
Punchbowl PS, Hampden Park PS, Berala PS, Chullora PS, Greenacre PS, Birrong PS and Yagoona
PS. This was a great initiative from Punchbowl PS to help nurture a sense of belonging and
connectedness for our students. I hope you enjoy the students'
reflection of the day. - Mrs McCoy.

Our arrival

We arrived at the school and we found the hall. We were all sitting and waiting so we played 'rock, paper, scissors' but after 20 minutes, all of the schools had arrived and we were able to do the smoking ceremony. Uncle John said "Ninganah!" and that meant it was time to go and start the smoking ceremony.

So, what is a smoking ceremony?



The smoking ceremony is how we were welcomed to Punchbowl's school and their land. Fire and smoke are very important in Aboriginal culture because it is believed to protect people from evil spirits, while fire is used for cooking as well as for warmth and yarning. Uncle John waved the smoke over all the teachers and students with a big bunch of Eucalyptus leaves. It smelled nice and was really calming. At first, I wondered why Uncle John was waving smoke over his head first? When we talk about it, I think it was because he was in charge of the whole ceremony and he might have been telling the fire.

"I'm the boss of this ceremony."

Aboriginal Art Lessons

Next, we went to the art classroom and we used water colour paints to 'stipple' around a boomerang with Corina. Stippling means to dab the paint onto the paper with your brush.

When we finished the stippling, we did some patterns inside the boomerang. They weren't normal patterns, they were Aboriginal symbols and they represented emotions, feelings and words. That's how the Aboriginal people used to communicate.









Corina showed us some Aboriginal artefacts like-the emu caller, shield, the tip of a 2m spear, possum and kangaroo fur, coolamon bags to carry berries, babies and resources.

There were 2 sticks, one with a hole in it, the other stick is put inside the hole and rolled around to make fire.



<u>Morning tea</u>

Then it was time for morning tea! We got to eat Aunty Carol's delicious lemon myrtle pancakes. We got to eat three each- we got the most out of everyone!



We had a yarning circle and everyone got to say their name, tribe/mob and what school they came from. I am from the Biripi tribe which is the same as Aunty Carol's tribe! (So she let us from Banksia Road get an extra pancake!). Aunty Carol is really cool.





Nature lessons

After morning tea, we went on a nature walk around the school with our learning journals. We had to find a

gumtree leaf with a 'story'. That meant it had to have different colours, holes in it-evidence that something happened to it. We went to another gumtree and the teacher asked the tree for permission to have one of its leaves. Trees have lives and it was a sign of respect because trees give




us life too.

We crushed up some leaves of the lemon eucalyptus tree and rubbed it on our paper. It smelled like lemon. We also sketched a bottle brush in our journals and we stuck some paperbark in our books. Paperbark can be used for nappies, bandaids and in cooking. We never rip paperbark off the tree because maybe the tree wants to keep it. We only use the paperbark from the ground.



Finally, we went to the garden and we were allowed to look for an ochre rock- if you found one you got to keep it. You could also get one from Miss Julie but we couldn't keep those ones. We drew on the rocks with our ocre and added water and used the ochre paint to draw on our page and on our hands.

Then we got to eat sausages- you had a choice of barbeque or tomato sauce and everyone got a sausage. We took a big picture with our stippled paintings as part of a big group.


COMMUNITY HUB NEWS EXPRESSION OF INTEREST - FIRST AID
